TREASURER'S REPORT January 2025 – Ron Salles

We continue to carry a reserve in the General Fund. The size of the reserve fluctuates from month to month, depending on the income and debts incurred, but most of the time there is enough working capital to keep our bills paid as they are received, along with any unexpected expenses that suddenly appear.

The General Fund is the money we use to pay the everyday bills, like power and heat, pastor's salary, insurance, office expenses, etc. I continue to pay our bills on time.

On the Mission Fund side, we no longer have any mission reserves as we distributed the funds for use last year. This year we will again concentrate on our local missions as our missions' projects; The Campership Fund (Scouts), The Ramp Mission (The Ramp Guys), The Lighthouse Mission (The Lighthouse Christmas), and The Avoca – Kanona Food Pantry. Jane's initial estimate of how many people she would be helping is in reality doubled and we have increased the funding in order to help.

The Capital Project Fund campaign to repair and repave the parking lot continues. This is work that needs to be done soon in order to save the current pavement. The work was to start the end of September, but has been delayed due to weather. The expansion part, however, was completed at the end of September, with the major part now scheduled for some time in May 2025.

The accepted quote is for about \$50,000.00, so that is the goal for this capital project. As of February 16, 2025, \$29.879.00 has been raised. Because of this outpouring, the Administrative Council decided not to seek a bank loan, but to borrow from our own reserves earmarked for other projects. We will just need to replenish these reserves.

Due to the delay in construction, and with the blessing of the Administrative Council, on October 15th I purchased a \$25,000.00 Certificate of Deposit at 4.5% to mature May 15, 2025. This will help earn some money for the project.

ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL Fred Groner

The 6 session series called "EVERYTHING IS POSSIBLE WITH GOD" by Pastor Rick Warren and led by Gary Weldy has been completed. The series involved what Pastor Warren calls the six phases of faith. Pastor Warren explains his views that GOD uses a predictable pattern and process to build our faith. Pastor Warren explains that understanding these six phases allows you to cooperate with GOD in the process of strengthening faith and building character.

Also we must learn not to trust in yourself but in GOD, and don't be hopeless but expect GOD to deliver. Jesus said, "According to your faith, will it be done to you" (Matthew 9:29). A strong faith prepares you for what GOD is about to do in your life. In the six sessions, Pastor Warren explained the process of building your faith with a dream, acting on your dream of faith, and putting it into action. Pastor Warren says that we should have patience because GOD will not fulfill your dream immediately because GOD uses difficulties to work on your faith. Also we must learn not to trust

in yourself but in GOD, and don't be hopeless but expect GOD to deliver.

In mid-January another seven-session, video-based study by Pastor Rick Warren was started called "HOW TO GET THROUGH WHAT YOU'R GOING THROUGH." Twenty-one (21) attended the initial session. Pastor Warren divides this seven session series into topics of shock, sorrow, struggle, surrender, sanctification, start seeing, and service.

GOOD FRIDAY TENEBRAE SERVICE

"Tenebrae" is the Latin word meaning "darkness." The service of Tenebrae as practiced in most Protestant Churches is an adaptation of medieval Roman Catholic practices for each of the days of Holy Week dating back to the ninth century. Our Avoca Methodist service will be held on Good Friday.

For most Protestants, the story of the suffering and death of Jesus from John's gospel is divided into 16 readings. After each segment of the story is read, a candle is extinguished. After the fifteenth reading, which confirms that Jesus had died on the cross, the last of the 15 lit candles is extinguished or taken away, and a loud sound (called *strepitus* in Latin) is made to convey the sense of total loss of God's presence and the effect of the death of Jesus on the universe. The final story of the burial is read in near darkness.

Worshipers leave in silence to ponder the impact of Christ's death and await the celebration of the coming Resurrection.

RECIPE CORNER

CROCK POT CRACK POTATO SOUP

Ingredients:

6 medium potatoes (peeled and diced)
1 medium onion (diced)
4 cups chicken broth
1 tsp garlic powder
½ tsp black pepper
1 block (8 oz.) cream cheese (softened)
2 cups shredded cheddar cheese
½ cup sour cream
½ cup cooked and crumbled bacon (plus extra for garnish)
Optional: ¼ cup chopped green onions for garnish

Directions:

Prepare the base: Add diced potatoes, onion, chicken broth, garlic powder, and black pepper to your crock pot. Stir to combine.

Cook: Cover and cook on low for 6-7 hours or high for 3-4 hours, until the potatoes are tender **Blend (optional):** For a creamer soup, use an immersion blender to blend some of the potatoes directly in the pot. Leave some chunks for texture, if desired.

Add the creamy ingredients: Stir in cream cheese, shredded cheddar, sour cream and bacon. Mix until everything is melted and combined. Serve: Ladle into bowls and top with extra bacon, shredded cheese, and green onions if desired.

Tips:

Add extra veggies like carrots or celery for a twist. Swap cream cheese with heavy cream for a lighter version.

Serve with crusty bread or a side salad for a complete meal.

COWBOY CORNBREAD CASSEROLE

Ingredients:

2 packs Jiffy cornbread mix
1 ½ lbs. ground beef
1 can rotel
1 can whole kernel corn
1 can ranch style beans
1 cup shredded cheese
1 pack taco seasoning

Directions:

Mix combread according to package instructions then set aside. Preheat oven to 425°

Brown ground beef, drain. Add taco seasoning, undrained can rotel, undrained ranch style beans, and drained corn. Simmer for about 5 minutes. Stir into cornbread mix. Mix in shredded cheese. Stir completely. Pour into a greased 9X13 casserole dish.

Bake approximately 25-30 minutes until toothpick comes out clean.

Can top it with more cheese, sour cream, salsa, or whatever your heart desires.
